OPEN PLAN

A tweaking of the floor plan gave this 1920s apartment in Sydney's east a bigger, brighter kitchen. The central bench, made from the same engineered walnut as the floor, functions as both extra prep area and casual dining space, and acts as a focal point and zone divider in a now open-plan room.
